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What is Advent?

Definition

The word Advent means “coming” or “arrival.” It is the time of year when the Church anticipates two things: the coming holiday in celebration of our King’s first arrival as a baby AND the still-to-come final arrival of that same King as the One Victorious over sin and death.

History & Significance

Advent has been observed by the Church since the 4th century. It marks the first day of the Christian New Year. Historically, it has been observed as a time of preparation and anticipation. Similar to the 6-week Lenten journey to Resurrection, Advent is a 4-week journey to Christmas that is spent reflecting on the reality of Christ’s first coming in order to strengthen our hope in His return (Second Advent).

Practices & Observances

Because it is a time of waiting or anticipation of the arrival of The King, observing Advent historically involves practices that cultivate expectant or patient waiting. We look at particular aspects of Christ’s character and his intent for his world and find ways to ponder how we have failed, to practice repentance, and intentionally implement practices that will prepare our hearts and bodies for His Second Advent as King in all glory!

Active Waiting

Devotional Thought for Nov. 30, Christian New Year

No one likes to wait. This is especially true for those surrounded by modern conveniences. Yet, God in his grace, has placed his people in a life of waiting – namely of waiting for him to fulfill the redemption he began with the sending of his Son. The season of Advent has traditionally been referred to as a time of cultivating the virtue of active waiting. But how do we do this?

We remember in Advent, the time of waiting before the birth of Jesus. And we remember that time of waiting... as a time when people were waiting, indeed longing, for something that would change everything, and at the same time, not quite knowing what that something would be. During Advent, Christians go back to that time of waiting. – Rowan Williams

First, by *remembering*. During the season of Advent, we intentionally remember the past fulfillment of God's promises. Throughout the Old Testament, God promised to send a deliverer to rescue his people. For this promise, His people waited and waited and waited. With the humble advent of Jesus, His Son, God kept his promise. It is in Jesus that we have been delivered from our sin, the power of the devil, and the reign of darkness. It is this past advent upon which our lives are now built and out of which we currently live. So, during Advent, spend time looking back, studying the OT stories and promises for the purpose of remembering with thanksgiving.

But Advent isn't simply about remembering, it is also about *looking forward*. For the same Jesus who came in humility will come again (Second Advent) in glory to bring about the full realization of His redemption. It is this future upon which we set our hope. One day we will see Jesus face to face and all will be as it should be – new and right. So Advent is also a time to ponder the hope we have because of Christ's first Advent.

Remembering and Looking Forward: Only when the past and future are held together can we learn to live thankfully, hopefully, and confidently in the present with our lives set on and by Jesus. The Daily Prayers and Scripture Readings in this booklet are intended to help us cultivate the grace of waiting. The meditations on pages 5-6 can be used each week of Advent as a starting place to think through how this season can help us see our past history and future hope as tools to live faithfully in the present.

Advent Topics for Meditation

Below is a brief explanation of the theme of each week of Advent. Use these thoughts, along with the Scripture readings, to discuss with your family and/or friends how these themes of Scripture shape our lives as Christians.

Week 1: Prophecy/Rescue

The first week of Advent focuses on all of the Old Testament prophecies or promises God gave to His people. He told them over and over in many different ways that He was going to save them from sin and all the effects sin has had on the world including death. In all of God's promises and rescue operations (from Egypt, David from Saul, Daniel from lions, the nation from Goliath, Shadrach, Meshach, & Abednego from the furnace, etc.) He was always showing His people that He loved them, that He would never abandon them and that He was going to save them fully from everything that held them captive and threatened to undo them.

Week 2: Humility/Bethlehem

During the second week of Advent we focus on the *way* God keeps his promises. Unlike the “power” of the world, God shows His power through serving. We read in Philippians that even though Jesus was equal with God, he wasn't focused on his rights and privileges. Rather, for love of His Father, He laid aside everything to which he had a right. And in Romans we hear that God is working ALL things together for our good and his glory. All things includes even the place and the way in which Jesus enters humanity – through a tiny town, in an animal trough, in a barn – in complete humility, holding on to NOTHING that he deserved. The servant is not greater than the master. In other words, the entry point into his family for us is humility – holding onto NOTHING to which we think we have a “right.” And this is also the path on which we continue our whole lives. The life of the Christian is to be a life of humble service in our King's world because our King first served us holding nothing back. Like our King, we are to look at the things we have and ask how we might use them to serve others.

Week 3: Shepherds/Joy

After pondering God's promises of rescue and the way in which he came to enact that rescue, we should be led to sing praises with joy. God has done what he said. And He has done so in a way that brings hope for salvation from sin and misery to even the lowliest. With the shepherds who were found standing in a darkened countryside, we have heard the news proclaimed from heaven. We have seen him lying in the manger. We have believed Jesus is the fulfillment of all God's promises of salvation. And we have an even better vantage point than the shepherds because we have seen the rest of the story of Jesus' life. We know that death unleashes its greatest anger and power upon this servant King, and He does not fight back but rather receives the blows on behalf of all humanity. And then we see Him get up – even from death! Sin, where is your power? Death where is your victory? “Joy to the world; the Savior reigns; let men their songs employ while fields and floods, rocks, hills, and plains repeat the sounding joy!”

Week 4: Peace/Angels

In the final week of Advent, it is good to focus on what all this means for us now. God, through the keeping of His promises has brought life to those who were dead, power over reigning sin, given us an inheritance in his world, his Kingdom without end. All of this could be summed up in this statement: God has made peace between heaven and earth. As we look around at the world in which we live, it may not seem like this is true. We not only see literal wars, but all kinds of ugliness, pain, and sorrow that belong to sin and death. This is where Christians have the joyful duty of being ambassadors for The Kingdom. We, who were formerly enemies of God, have peace with Him through Christ, The King. Now, we get to live in the sure hope of what that peace will mean when He comes again in glory. We live our lives in an effort to show forth the peace of Christ to everyone we encounter. Sing with joy, grieve with hope, live in every promise of His Word.

[†] By referring to Jesus's descent into hell, the Christian embraces two truths. First, Jesus suffered the anguish and pain of hell on behalf of his people while on the cross. Secondly, Jesus experienced the reign of death by remaining in the tomb after the crucifixion.

[‡] The term "catholic" refers to the universal and true church, meaning that Christ's church has no temporal, racial, economic, geographic, or language barriers and that His church adheres to the doctrine confessed by the early church councils.
